- Wipes away venial sins
- Gives us spiritual nourishment and strength
- An increase and deepening of baptismal grace
- Gives us a special strength of the Holy Spirit to spread and defend the faith by word and action
- Increases in us the gifts of the Holy Spirit
- Enabled to act as a representative of Christ, Head of the Church, in his triple office of priest, prophet, and king.
- Gives spouses the grace to love each other with the grace with which Christ has loved His Church
- The grace of the Sacrament perfects the human love of the spouses
- It sanctifies them on the way to eternal life
- The strengthening, peace, and courage to endure in a Christian manner the sufferings of illness or old age
